- Do you support Canada substantially **increasing defence spending**? What **% GDP** should Canada be spending on defence?

- Do you support **seizing frozen Russian assets** and providing these assets **to Ukraine**?
- Do you support designating **Russia a state supporter of terrorism**?
- Do you support the automatic renewal of work permits under the CUAET visa program?
